
Her Definition of the Outdoors

Project Idea! - Leadership

Reach out to a 4th grade teacher in your school district and see if they would be interested in ordering free tree seedlings for their students. In April, when the seedlings arrive, you can help distribute them in the classroom and talk about basic steps to plant and care for the tree.

Details:

Every year since 1984, Wisconsin 4th-grade students have been eligible to receive a free tree seedling from the DNR reforestation program to complement their Arbor Day observations. The application period for the "2022-23 Arbor Day Free Tree Seedlings for Wisconsin 4th Graders" is now open. School principals, 4th-grade teachers and 4th-grade homeschool parents are encouraged to visit this DNR webpage to order seedlings for Wisconsin 4th-grade students.

The seedlings will be shipped next spring in time for Arbor Day celebrations. They come with a protective bag and instructions on how to plant and care for them. Planting a seedling and watching it grow can be a great learning tool for students. Find

TREE FELLING COURSE AT UW-STEVENS POINT

In this course, high schoolers will join UW-Stevens Point forestry undergraduate students and industry professionals in a 3-day, field-intensive chainsaw training. As part of this course, you will work directly with more than 10 industry professionals to gain the knowledge, skills, and experience needed to safely fell a tree. Through guided field training you will learn how to safely cut down, delimb, and buck a tree while earning an industry-recognized certificate and college credit. Specifically, you will learn directional felling and chainsaw safety while earning 1 credit in FOR 396 from UWSP and Tree Felling certification from UWSP and Husqvarna. All participants will receive a complimentary set of personal protective equipment, donated by Husqvarna, including chainsaw chaps, hard hat with hearing protection, and safety glasses. All costs are covered by program sponsors.

Who can apply? High school junior and senior students. Application Deadline: February 3, 2023 **When:** March 24-26, 2023, Treehaven, Tomahawk, Wis.*

*Housing will not be available. All participating students will be responsible for their own housing and transportation to and from Treehaven.

Alumni SPOTLIGHT

Name: Olivia UW-Stevens Point Major: Fisheries

On November 8th I got the opportunity to work with the DNR transferring Lake Sturgeon up river to the Shawano Dam to just below Keshena Falls on the Menominee Reservation. The reason they bring Lake Sturgeon up river is because Keshena is the historic spawning grounds for the Lake Sturgeon before the two dams on the Wolf River were built. Also the Menominee Tribe has a connection with the fish, which the state wants to preserve and protect.

We arrived at the river about 9am with 2 other students from UWSP. The Oshkosh Fisheries Biologist, Margaret Stadig, explained the process and what we would be doing. There were DNR staff members and other volunteers like myself participating in this process. We waited until the electrofishing crew got back and loaded the sturgeon into the holding pen. From there we used a large net to scoop the fish out of the holding pen and onto the stretcher. Then the fish were measured, checked for tags (the fish that did not have tags, got them), and checked for diseases before they were loaded into the stocking truck. We not only got to handle many large sturgeon, but also handled a 50+ inch musky. This was a great hands-on, educational experience.






